## Message from Mr Huxtable—Willow Class

It has been fantastic to welcome back Willow Class this week. We have worked really hard with our addition and subtraction and the children have really impressed me with their problem solving skills related to this they have had a real chance to shine in our Barvember exercises. I have included one below so you can see just how hard they are working! This took real determination and resilience for the children to stick with this task.

In English our efforts have been centred on raising the level of both punctuation and vocabulary in our written work. We have also focused on Paragraph cohesion!
