Do you know how we start our day in Oak Class? Each morning when we arrive at school we hang our bags and coats on our pegs really quickly because we just can't wait to get on with our morning task. Every morning we spend 10 minutes during the register remembering and writing our spellings for the week.

We cover the word.


We write the word.


We check the word.

This is just one way we are improving our spelling ability and you can do this at home too with the copy of spelling words that come home each week. It only takes 10 minutes a day and short bursts on a regular basis will help your child remember the words.

Some of the class are being challenged by spelling rules. Throughout their phonics lessons they have been taught to sound out words to help them to spell but some words are just difficult! They don't follow those rules they have their own!

This week we have begun to look at words that have the 'j' sound but when we write it, it could be j or g or dge, or ge. We looked carefully at a collection of words Mrs Bramwell gave us and had to sort them to find the spelling pattern. This was tricky but we loved the challenge.









Message from Mr Huxtable—Willow Class

Willow Class have been very busy this week. We have had the opportunity to watch clips of A Series of Unfortunate Events in our whole class reading. This has been fantastic for the children to see those characters come to life and the children created some fantastic writing based on this. They were challenged to use the same language as Lemony Snickett and they all managed to do this really well.

In maths, we enjoyed thinking mathematically and strategically by playing various maths games based on multiplication. One of our games that we included was called Tic Tac Toe products and required the children to think really hard about their choices with number and the calculations they needed to do. I really recommend this game for a rainy afternoon!

Task Instructions

- The aim of the activity is to match cards with the same numerical answer, shown through different representations.
- Lay all the cards down on a table and ask children to take turns picking them; pick as many as they find with the same answer (shown through any representation).

For example 9 and 4 can be shown with an area model, sets of objects such as dominoes, and the number sentence. When students match the cards they should explain how they know that the different cards are equivalent. This activity encourages an understanding of multiplication as well as rehearsal of math facts.

Games like this really stretch a child's determination and resilience and it can be a good opportunity to talk about the learning characteristics that support us to be successful mathematicians.



Message from Mr Lea - Chestnut Class

What a week in Chestnut Class - packed full of learning!!

In our English work we have been inspired by the picture book 'The Arrival by Shaun Tan', creating a Warning Tale using some of the illustrations - we let our Imagination and Creative skills go wild!

In Science we discovered the many processes that Water has to go through before it reaches our homes - did you know there are seven different stages? Ask your children to see how many they can recall!

As part of our study of the Awra Amba community we all became expert summarisers as we all worked purposefully on different areas of their daily lives - in Awra Amba there is no division of labour - any person regardless can complete any job - this is very progressive for an African community.

This week we have been very reflective - thinking back to the events commemorated on Remembrance Day - we created poppies with Mrs Lea! - which we all enjoyed and also made us think about the sacrifices people made for us. All of our poppies are displayed in our class windows!
