Another week rushes by and we haven't had a moment to even pause to sharpen our very busy pencils!

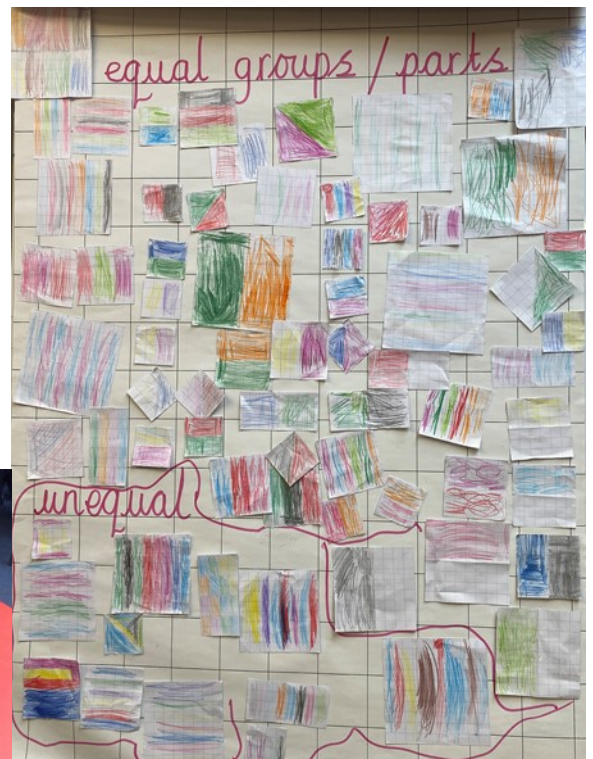
