Message from Mr Euinton – Chestnut Class

Hello All - another week in the bank and some more excellent progress from the children. In mathematics, we have finished out nit on place value and have started looking at addition and subtraction. The children are demonstrating a solid understanding of these fundamental basics and are building on them to start seeing patterns which will help in the long run. I've been quite impressed with their consideration of number lines and rounding - these are areas which children often find challenging but they have done a great job with them in Chestnut Class.

In English, we have published our stories - many of the children have asked me to photocopy their work so they can take it home so watch this space. We have now moved on to looking at the poetry of Valerie Bloom and have looked in a bit more detail at personification and metaphor. The main writing task will be to write our own free verse poems about the four seasons in response to Bloom's *Two Seasons*. I think poetry is the hardest thing to write - well, the hardest thing to write well anyway - but the children are definitely up for the challenge.

Once again, I have been blown away by the breadth of the discussions we've had in the afternoons. This week they have ranged from an investigation into the nature of luck and how the same events can be lucky and unlucky at different times and depending on context, to a contemplation of whether all life has the same inherent value - and whether our view on this might be different depending on context.

This week has also seen over half of Year 6 put themselves up for election to the Pupil Parliament. Every single one of them did a fantastic job writing and presenting their case to the school during assembly. Some were very nervous beforehand but it really didn't show - they should all be very proud of themselves. Public speaking and the ability to debate issues are very important skills to develop and I'm glad to see the children embracing them.
